FOOD FOR OTHERS

We will continue our collection of non-perishable food to donate to "Food For Others" at the Chapter picnic. Members generously donated 218 pounds of food during the April meeting. From the www.FoodforOthers.org/give-food web site, here is more information. Most needed items include:

- Fresh fruits (oranges, apples, bananas, tomatoes, avocados, grapes, berries)
- Fresh vegetables (cucumbers, celery, peppers, lettuce, eggplant)

- Oil
- Cereal
- Canned tomato products (crushed, peeled, diced, etc.), 4oz – 1 lb
- Canned meat (chicken, turkey, or seafood), 2oz – 15oz
- Rice, 16oz packages
- Spaghetti sauce, 14oz 1 lb (ideally in cans instead of glass)
- Canned fruit (packed in fruit juice instead of syrup) 11oz – 20oz

- Dried or canned beans (black, kidney, pinto, etc.)
- Pasta
- Fruit juice (100% juice) 32oz 64oz

Non Food Items:

- New or Clean Reusable Grocery Bags 8 ½ x 14 x 15
- Can openers

PROTECT YOURSELF FROM "SKIMMING"

BE ALERT - The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) defines "skimming" as an event that occurs when devices are illegally installed on ATMs, point-of-sale (POS) terminals, or fuel pumps capture data or record cardholders' PINs. Criminals use this data to create fake debit cards or credit cards and then steal from victims' accounts. Skimming is estimated to cost institutions and consumers more than \$1 billion annually. Here are a few tips offered by the FBI on what you can do to protect yourself from skimming when using a fuel pump, ATM, or POS terminal:

- Inspect ATMs and other card readers before using. Look for anything loose, crooked, damaged, or scratched. Don't use the reader if you notice anything unusual.
- Pull at the edges of the keypad before entering your PIN. Then, cover the keypad when you enter your PIN to prevent cameras from recording your entry.
- Use ATMs in a well-lit, indoor location, which are less vulnerable targets.
- Be alert for skimming devices in tourist areas, which are popular targets.

- Use debit and credit cards with chip technology. In the U.S., there are fewer devices that steal chip data versus magnetic strip data.
- Avoid using your debit card when you have linked accounts. Use a credit card instead.

Contact your financial institution if the ATM doesn't return your card after you end or cancel a transaction.

LEGISLATIVE NEWS

(As of May 17, 2022)

NATIONAL LEGISLATION - Congress has started the process of writing the bills that set spending levels and make policy decisions for the upcoming fiscal year, including matters such as agency staffing levels and the next federal pay raise.

The Appropriations committees of both the House and Senate have been holding hearings on the administration's budget plan issued in March, the first step in a process designed to result in enactment of q dozen measures by September 30. However, in practice the typical outcome is enactment of one or more temporary measures with final decisions not reached until months later.

That again appears to be the most likely outcome, with Congress scheduled to be in session only most of 10 weeks before the deadline, and then recess for all of October until mid-November after the mid-term elections. In many recent years, only the House has made substantial progress on the individual spending bills, with the Senate often producing only broad outlines and then working out details in later meetings with the House.

Among the issues that has been attracting early attention in one of those bills, the general government measure, is the potential size of the January 2023 federal employee raise. President Biden has proposed a 4.6 percent average increase, with some variance by locality, while federal employee organizations and many Democrats in Congress have been advocating for 5.1 percent.

Another common practice of recent years, though, is for Congress to take no position on the raise, leaving the decision in the President's hands---generally resulting in a default raise of what he originally recommended.

Issues regarding staffing levels meanwhile have been raised regarding the IRS and the VA, and federal law enforcement entities, including U.S. Customs and Border Protection and the Bureau of Prisons. (FEDweek)

Through seven months of the counting period toward the January 2023 federal retirement cost of living adjustment, the COLA count stands at 6 percent, following an increase in April of 0.5 percentage points in the inflation index used to set the COLA.

Barring a change of direction in inflation during the rest of the measuring period, the count already is in line to top the increase paid in January of this year, which was 5.9 percent for those retired under CSRS and 4.9 percent for those retired under FERS who are eligible for COLAs (generals not until reaching age 62).

The increase was the largest since the 8.7 percent paid in 1982, before the FERS system even existed. **(FEDweek)**

<u>VIRGINIA LEGISLATION</u> - The General Assembly's regular session adjourned in mid-March, with the budget and dozens of other bills still unfinished. There was still no budget deal to vote on when lawmakers returned on April 4 to go into special session, and there was no budget when the legislature returned on April 27 to take up Governor Youngkin's vetoes and amendments to regular bills.

The state's current budget year is set to end June 30, meaning lawmakers have several weeks to act to avoid a potential government shutdown. The main sticking point in the budget negotiations has been over the scope of billions in tax cuts proposed by Gov. Youngkin. The Republican-led House of Delegates largely supports them. Senate Democrats have rejected several key tax proposals, including Youngkin's push for a gas tax holiday and to lower some filer's income taxes by doubling the state's standard deduction.

The two lawmakers leading budget negotiations, House Appropriations Chairman Barry Knight, R-Virginia Beach, and Senate Finance Committee Chairwoman Janet Howell, D-Fairfax, reported after meeting that that they were making.
