<u>Please note</u>: We take the summer off, so our next newsletter will be our August 2023 edition and we will have no chapter meetings in July and August.

<u>May Program Report</u> – Virginia State Senator David Marsden (37th District) and House Delegate Vivian Watts (39th District) addressed our chapter meeting.

Senator Marsden focused his comments on the budget, juvenile detention, and

climate change. Virginia is in the second year of its two-year budget cycle, and currently has a surplus. There has been support for more funding in mental health and education. Unlike the Federal Government, Virginia must balance its budget. Only 5% of the General Fund can go to the retirement of debt. An area of improvement within the Commonwealth

is juvenile detention. In 2001, the state began using ankle bracelets to monitor some juvenile delinquents in lieu of incarceration, which allows juveniles to better integrate

back into society. This practice has yielded measurable benefits by reducing the number of kids requiring residential incarceration and providing opportunities for rehabilitation.

Regarding climate issues, there's concern about the proliferation of data centers, which create a burden on power companies trying to meet future clean energy requirements. More could be done in urban areas to consider expansion of solar panels to parking lots, tops of buildings, and streets. There's a proposal to expand and fund charging stations for electric vehicles in Virginia's rural areas, especially those areas with tourist attractions.

Delegate Watts focused her comments on staffing standards in nursing homes, and the budget. Unlike most states, Virginia did not have staffing standards for nursing homes. We had a 20% higher death rate in nursing homes during COVID than other states, which might have been reduced had we had standards. People are living longer, and the costs of residential nursing homes are rising. We need more Certified Nursing Assistants (CNAs), as well as other positions to ensure better care. In Virginia and around the country insufficient pay and benefits are creating a high turnover rate for CNAs, thus further affecting staffing shortages. The good news is that legislation has been passed which establishes some staffing standards for the State's Medicaid patients, but key to success will be vigilant enforcement of those standards. (continued from page 2) Regarding the budget, the Governor proposed a \$1.4B permanent tax cut. However, as proposed, higher income residents would receive a

greater benefit than other taxpayers, and the bulk of taxpayers might only see a reduction or refund of \$150 or less – depending on income. The state tax cut proposal could change state funding for local activities, such as education, leaving local jurisdictions to generate funding at the local level.

Greater detail on the impact of state and local taxes on various localities can be found in a University of Richmond Public Interest Law Review article by Delegate Watts (Vivian E. Watts, Virginia Tax Re-Structuring: 100 Years

Ago, 50 Years Ago, and Now, 26 Rich. Pub. Int. L. Rev. 185 (2023). Available at: https://scholarship.richmond.edu/pilr/vol26/iss1/9).

Several options for a tax cut are under consideration by the State Senate: 1) one-time rebate rather than a structural change, based on the surplus; 2) increase the standard deduction so it brings the floor up for everyone; and 3) for families in most need, make Earned Income Tax Credit 100%. The House leans toward supporting the Governor's permanent tax cut. However, revenues are going down, drawing closer to original projections so the current surplus may not be sustained.

LEGISLATION REPORT –

Federal Legislation -- H.R. 2811, Limit, Save, Grow Act of 2023 (Debt Ceiling



Increase/Federal Spending Decrease) -- The House passed legislation to increase the Debt Ceiling by \$1.5 trillion or until March 31, 2024, whichever comes first. But it would also require a reduction in nondefense discretionary spending, reverting FY 2024 budget funding

to fiscal year 2022 levels, reportedly representing a 23 percent average cut. In addition, funding increases would be limited to 1 percent per year for the next 10 years. Within the legislation are some specific programs to be rescinded (like \$80 million for the IRS to improve operations; limited or no tax credits for green energy enhancements, etc.). But a lot of specifics are left to be determined, and that should bring a level of concern

FY 2024 Federal Budget – The House has yet to come forth with its FY 2024 budget proposal. However, should H.R. 2811 (see above) pass the Senate, just how does an agency operate at FY 2022 levels when employee pay was increased 5% in FY 2023, contractors have increased labor costs, and goods and services have increased with inflation. The federal community could be impacted with reduced pay and benefits, increased cost sharing, or higher taxes. Please pay close attention to any NARFE "Calls for Action" issued during the summer months.

Federal Debt Ceiling approaching -- If the current stalemate between the Administration and the House continues, there could be a delay in issuing payments for federal salaries, annuities, Social Security, and Medicare reimbursement to providers. While the Federal Government has been on the brink of default before, wisdom prevailed and default was avoided, but not without a cost by way of increased borrowing expense. (If you expect to receive a tax credit for buying a "green" heat pump technology, an electric car, or an induction stove, you may be surprised – if passed, H.R. 2811 claws back those tax credits. Be prepared - you might be better served to save your money just in case you do not receive timely annuity checks this summer.)

H.R. 82/S. 597, Social Security Fairness Act -- The Bill now has 262 co-Sponsors, getting closer to the 290 co-sponsors needed to calendar a floor vote. This bill would repeal the Government Pension Offset and Windfall Elimination Provisions which negatively impact many federal and state/municipal retirees by cutting their earned Social Security benefits.

State Legislation -- The Virginia General Assembly's Reconvene session is concluded. Left unresolved was the Governor's request to pass changes to the budget that provide \$1 billion in tax relief for Virginians and deliver over \$2.6 billion for job growth, public safety, education excellence, and behavioral health services. At issue is the best way to

reduce taxes while increasing services. Sounds good, but as always, the devil is in the details.

Alzheimer's Report — Beta-amyloid plaques are one of the unwanted structures in the brain that promote Alzheimer's disease. The plaques collect between the brain's neurons and disrupt cell functions in the brain. Two amyloid plaque clearing drugs have been shown to slow cognitive and functional decline in people with early Alzheimer's. One drug, *Leqembi*, has received conditional approval by the FDA. The other, *Donanemab*, is still in clinical trials but could allow more people with early-stage Alzheimer's to continue to engage in activities that hold value for them. Thanks for everyone's support of the Alzheimer's Research Fund. So far this year, the chapter has collected \$1,895 in donations to the Fund. <u>VFN Elections</u> -- Elections for the Virginia Federation of NARFE (VFN) officers and on Bylaw amendments will take place electronically until May 31st. As a NARFE member

residing in Virginia or as a member of a Virginia Federation chapter you are entitled to vote in these elections. There are two contested offices which must be decided: President and Secretary. Running for President are **Frances Boatman** and **Doris McAdams**. Running for Secretary are **Deborah Fisk** and **Esther Nash**. Also, on the ballot are two amendments proposed by the VFN Board of Directors. The first would change the quorum requirement for VFN meetings from .005% of membership to 10 members; this approach was recommended by the National Secretary/Treasurer. It does not affect chapters. The second amendment proposed by the VFN Board of Directors to change Annual Meeting notification from 60 days prior to 30 days prior to the meeting. This change will help the Federation take advantage of the national magazine publication schedule to provide notice to NARFE members in Virginia.
