During NARFE's 2023 Fall Membership Drive, which runs until December 31, 2023, current members can earn \$10 for each new member they recruit. SERVICE OFFICER REPORT – SUSAN LARSON AND JIM HATHAWAY

The annual federal benefits "Open Season" allows federal employees, retirees and survivors to make decisions about which health insurance and supplemental dental and/or vision insurance they want to have for the following year. Even if you have been enrolled for many years, it is important that you review your coverage based on how your life — and your healthcare plan — may have changed. The annual period to make changes for the following year takes place from November 13 through December 11, 2023. Changes in insurance this open season are significant. It is important to make a cost comparison when choosing FEHB and FEDVIP plans. No action is required unless you want to make a change.

Learn as much as you can to make wise decisions on changing, adjusting, or keeping your current insurance. You can attend Congressman Connolly's workshop on November 18th where you will have an opportunity to meet personally with representatives from all the local health plans. The workshop will take place on **Saturday**, **November 18, from 10 AM to 1 PM**. Like last year, this year's event will take place in-person at the **Fairfax County Government Center**: **12000 Government Center Parkway Fairfax**, **VA 22035.** Presentations will be given by Mr. Walt Francis, a Federal Employees Health Benefits expert, and Mr. Ed DeHarde, the Assistant Director of OPM, who manages all Federal Employee Insurance Operations.

Before Open Season begins on November 13, it is important to review what is new in the Federal Employees Health Benefit Program. As in previous years, there are significant premium, benefit, and plan availability changes that will affect both active and retired federal employees. Every federal employee and annuitant should check Section 2, "What's New for 2024," of their plan's official FEHB brochure, plus any other plan they are considering. This is where the plan will inform you of important benefit changes. While some plans will have very few and may only mention premium, other plans may have quite different benefits in 2024 that could affect your decision.

There are many changes this year in the Blue Cross prescription drug coverage and those affected should have received a letter explaining the addition of the Medicare Prescription Drug plan. According to our BC/BS representative this change is overwhelmingly positive. You need to take into consideration your current plan. For those enrolled in the Standard Option plan, you may have stayed with the plan because of extremely expensive or tier 3 or 4 drugs. Many retirees have the Basic Option plan where you are eligible for an annual \$800 Medicare reimbursement amount. If you currently are enrolled in Medicare Part A or Part B, you are eligible for this new coverage. There is no extra cost to you, and you are automatically enrolled unless you opt out. The major reason we were given why someone would opt out is if they are prescribed prescriptions that are so expensive that they use coupons.

With Humana exiting the FEHB program, there are far fewer plans available in 2024 than 2023—only 156 compared to 271. Sentara High has a new plan available in Northern Virginia. Compass Rose has changed their offerings with both a high and standard option. They have also expanded their enrollment criteria by granting Veterans Affairs Department employees and retirees eligibility.

Remember if your plan is no longer available next year, you must choose a new one or you will be automatically enrolled in the least expensive national PPO plan which is GEHA Elevate. United Choice Plus Advanced is increasing the catastrophic out-of-pocket maximum from \$3,000 to \$6,000 for self-only enrollees and from \$6,000 to \$12,000 for self-plus-one and self-&-family enrollees. Some plans are offering some new benefits next year. SAMBA plans offer doula coverage, BCBS plans have both marital and family counseling and medically necessary genetic testing.

REPORT ON OCTOBER 10th CHAPTER MEETING – CHRIS GIESELER

Chapter President Kathy Arpa called the meeting to order at 1:07 pm at the Vienna Community Center (VCC) and then led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance. New members were introduced or pointed out. Kathy asked 1st Vice-President and Programs Chair Ralph Dantinne to introduce our guest speaker, Michele Nesbitt-Johnson, from BlueCross/BlueShield. Ralph did so and provided some biographical information about her.



Ms. Johnson (pictured here) began her presentation by thanking us for the invitation to speak and by noting that part of her presentation will be available electronically; to access that part of the presentation, Chapter members can provide Kathy with their respective email addresses. Ms. Johnson reminded us that Open Season runs from November 13 until December 11, 2023.

She explained that there were not many changes for the 2024 BC/BS plans compared to this year's plans, but some items need attention. One such item is the new Medicare Prescription Drug provisions, which resulted from OPM's efforts to have FEHB health insurance carriers enhance benefits for federal employees. The goal of the new Medicare Prescription Plan is to leverage drug

coverage with other coverage to get deep discounts and more options.

To be eligible for the Medicare Prescription Plan (MPP), any FEHB member must have Medicare Parts A and B and be a citizen of the U.S. Thus, someone who has Medicare and also has BC/BS coverage is eligible for the MPP, and, according to Ms. Johnson, would be automatically enrolled in MPP, unless they choose to opt out. Significantly, there will not be an additional premium for the MPP. An advantage of the MPP is greater patient access to a larger spectrum of medical formulary, which is a list of drugs that member get access to. (Nonformulary costs are likely to be more expensive than formulary drugs.) To opt out of (aka "disenroll" from) MPP, contact OPM. You are also allowed to disenroll from MPP and enroll in FEHB prescription coverage; but drug formularies will differ.

Ms. Johnson provided the following comments, many of them addressing new items for 2024:

- As a retiree, if you drop FEHB coverage, you cannot get back in.
- BC/BS's "MyBlue" plan provides more discounts. Only ten percent of BC/BS members belong to the MyBlue plan. There is an associated portal from which to get more information. The plan also provides \$150 in discounts for retailers listed with MyBlue, and there are gym discounts.
- All BC/BS members will get new BC/BS cards.
- The current diabetes incentive will go away next year, but the current diabetes management program will continue.
- Blue Health Assessment—members will get \$50 for filling out the assessment form. Members will also get "lifestyle" suggestions from the program.
- BC/BS will be introducing a new Watch Line. This program provides a \$40 incentive. Members can develop goals (e.g., walk five miles) and spend the cash to use however they wish to buy cough drops, spend at the pharmacy, pay any applicable copays, and so forth.
- Regarding mental health, benefits for family and marital counseling will now be provided.
- Regarding hearing aids, BC/BS will now require prior authorization in order to get hearing aids.
- BC/BS has an overseas benefit program that provides benefits to BC/BS members who need medical care while traveling or living overseas. By contrast, Ms. Johnson noted, Medicare does not provide coverage overseas. The new BC/BS cards will have the overseas administrator's phone number to locate participating providers overseas.

- For dental and vision coverage, please see the handouts that Ms. Johnson provided. Copies of the handouts are available by contacting Kathy Arpa at mkarpa@hotmail.com. These coverages are independent of medical coverage and have separate premiums. BC/BS members get \$200 off lenses and 20% off other vision-related items.
- BC/BS covers pre-existing conditions and provide coupon to members if BC/BS covers a brand-name drug that does not have generics.

Ms. Johnson reminded us that the Medicare Reimbursement Account (MRA) benefit is still available, whereby BC/BS members who are covered by Medicare Part B [and who have BC/BS Basic Option] can get \$800 as a refund to pay some of their Medicare premiums. Annually, each person claiming the MRA needs to send BC/BS proof of their Medicare premium payment. If you would like this benefit, consider moving to Basic coverage under BC/BS.

At the conclusion of Ms. Johnson's remarks, the meeting was recessed for a break. Attendees were invited to partake in goodies provided by Hostess Jayne Seidman and others. At the end of the break, Kathy called the meeting back into order, with officers and committee reports, followed by Old Business, New Business and Announcements. Updated information regarding the foregoing is presented throughout this Newsletter.

After the drawings for the 50/50 cash raffle and for several door prizes, Kathy announced the dates for Newsletter submission and for the next Board meeting and Chapter meeting. Then, upon motion and second, the meeting adjourned at 3:03 pm.

LEGISLATION REPORTS

National Legislation – Jim Hathaway

This report will comment on two topics of interest to current and former Federal employees. The new Speaker of the House Mr. Mike Johnson, and the first 10 drugs subject to Medicare price negotiations.

Speaker of the House Mr. Mike Johnson

As background, James Michael Johnson was elected to serve as the 56th speaker of the United States House of Representatives on October 25, 2023. A member of the Republican Party, Johnson is in his fourth House term, having represented Louisiana's 4th congressional district since 2017.

The first 10 drugs subject to Medicare price negotiations

The Biden administration recently unveiled the names of the first 10 drugs subject to price negotiations by Medicare, including several popular blood thinners and diabetes medications. They are: Eliquis, Jardiance, Xarelto, Januvia, Farxiga, Entresto, Enbrel, Imbruvica and Stelara, as well as Fiasp and certain other insulins made by Novo Nordisk, including NovoLog. The medications treat heart disease, certain cancers, diabetes and autoimmune diseases, among other conditions. According to the Department of Health and Human Services, Medicare enrollees paid a total of \$3.4 billion in out-of-pocket costs for these drugs last year. Those who did not receive financial assistance shelled out as much as \$6,500 on average.

Once set, the negotiated prices take effect in 2026 – though the drug industry has filed multiple lawsuits seeking to derail the effort. The White House estimates that up to nine million seniors will be taking the drugs on the list at that time. These are the first 10 drugs subject to Medicare price negotiations.

Virginia State Legislation – Chris Gieseler

This year, members of the Virginia General Assembly can prefile their legislation proposals for the 2024 Regular Session of the General Assembly beginning November 20, 2023, and ends at 10 am on January 10, 2024, the first day of that Regular Session. By contrast, in non-election years, the prefiling process would begin in mid-July prior to the then-upcoming Regular Session of the General Assembly.

Inclement Weather Policy –. When Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) are closed or "virtual only" because of inclement weather on the day of a scheduled chapter meeting, the <u>chapter meeting for that month is canceled</u>. If the FCPS opens only two hours late on the day of a chapter meeting, the meeting will be held.
