Making a firm reservation for the luncheon is very important.

I returned to my home in Milwaukee the other day from a two week trip to the Philippines. When I left, it was mid-Winter and snow was knee deep; when I returned, there was no snow. Though technically Spring is right around the corner, practically winters in Wisconsin have noticeably gotten more mild over the decades. Even in Virginia, where I had once lived during my Federal career, steady rising sea water along the coast has been measured. These empirical observation cannot be ignored and should be cause for concern about man's effect on the climate

In the Philippines, there is no Social Security as we know it; there is no Medicare, and to the best of my knowledge there is no organization of retired government workers like NARFE. These institutions with which we are accustomed did not pop into existence by magic. It took the hardships of the Depression, for example, to motivate voters to make politicians create them. Their continued existence likewise is not guaranteed as everyone must know especially when we hear about organized campaigns in every Congress which try to abolish them in their present public form or to undercut the civil service with something like Schedule F.

Being a member of NARFE implies the recognition that Federal retirement benefits are also not guaranteed. Ponder that idea for awhile and then consider offering your help to run the Fairfax Chapter of NARFE in some way. # FOOD FOR OTHERS

In December we collected 336 pounds of food and \$100 in donations for "Food for Others". Needed items include: **Food Items** (no more than 3 years expired, unopened, labeled, not homemade):

- Fresh fruits (oranges, apples, bananas, tomatoes, avocados, grapes, berries)
- Fresh vegetables (cucumbers, celery, peppers, lettuce, eggplant)
- Cooking Oil (ideally in cans or plastic instead of glass)
- Dry goods cereal, pasta, rice, (16 oz packages), dried beans
- Canned vegetables, meat (2oz 15oz), and fruit (packed in juice 11 oz 20 oz)
- Spaghetti sauce, 14 oz 1 lb (ideally in cans or plastic instead of glass)
- Fruit juice (100% juice) 32 oz 64 oz

Refer to the <u>www.FoodforOthers.org/give-food</u> website for a list of most needed items and information on the Power Pack Program (P3) that provides for food insecure children on weekends when they are out of school. ## **LEGISLATIVE REPORT**

**<u>NATIONAL LEGISLATION-</u>** On January 18, Congress passed legislation to keep the federal government open into March, approving the third short-term stopgap spending bill in four months to avert a looming partial government shutdown.

The House approved the measure by a vote of 314-108, with opposition coming mostly from the more conservative members of the Republican conference. Shortly before the vote, the House Freedom Caucus announced it "strongly opposes" the measure because it would facilitate more spending than they support.

The measure extends current spending levels and buys time for the two chambers to work out their differences over full-year spending bills for the fiscal year that began in October. The temporary measure will run to March 1 for some federal agencies. Their funds were set to run out on January 19. It extends the remainder of government operations

to March 8.

House Speaker Mike Johnson, R-La. has been under pressure from his right flank to scrap a \$1.66 trillion budget price tag he reached with Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer for the spending bills. However, Johnson insisted he will stick with the deal and centrists in the party have stood behind him, saying changing course would be going back on his word and would weaken the speaker in future negotiations. (Federal News Network)

The U.S. Senate voted on February 12 to approve a \$95 billion aid package providing funds for Ukraine, Israel and partners in the Indo-Pacific, including Taiwan, along with facilities for humanitarian aid. The bill must still be approved by the Republican-led House of Representatives before becoming law. It faces stringent opposition from many in the GOP, who have pushed for the inclusion of domestic security on the southern border. **(CNBC politics)** 

**<u>VIRGINIA LEGISLATION</u>**- A remade Virginia General Assembly convened its 2024 session on January 10 with a Democratic majority newly in charge of both chambers.

In December, Gov. Glenn Youngkin proposed his two-year budget, which called for lowering the income tax while raising the state's sales tax. The proposal would've amounted to a roughly \$1 billion tax cut. On February 2, a Senate Finance and Appropriations subcommittee voted unfavorably on the tax proposal, recommending carrying it over to next year, which is a polite way of killing the measure. **(WCVE News)** 

Previously, on January 29, the Virginia Senate passed a bill that authorizes local governments to increase their local sales tax to fund school construction projects if voters approve the bill in a referendum. (Virginia Mercury)

Out of 1,000-plus bills being debated in this General Assembly session, around 100 concern transportation, with a few dedicated to speed reduction. A bill (HB 1071) allowing localities to reduce speed limits below 25 mph but not less than 15 mph is pending approval by the Senate Committee on Transportation after passage by the House. **(VPM.org, fastdemocracy.com)** 

# A bill that cleared an early hurdle would broaden the state's revenge porn law by adding a new category of "sexual" images that would be unlawful to disseminate.

The Virginia House and Senate overwhelmingly passed a bill that ends preference admissions of children of alumni at its public universities. (Richmond Times-Dispatch)

As the session reached midpoint, the Democratic-controlled assembly advanced bills to safeguard abortion access and increase the minimum wage, just a few of the partisan priorities that ensure a showdown with Gov. Youngkin.

Senate Democrats declined to advance a bill setting up a Virginia Sports and Entertainment Authority to oversee the creation of a \$2 billion arena for the Wizards and Capitals at Potomac Yard in Alexandria, citing financial concerns. However, the House approved a bill on the matter by a vote vote of 59-40, keeping the matter moving forward for a final decision later. (Washington Post)


# 2024 NARFE-FEEA FUND SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS
