

VFN Bylaws Proposals will also be voted upon and are posted on the VFN website (If accepted, these will be determined by the VFN Board and covered in the Handbook):

1. Eliminate from the Bylaws the 3-year limitation for Bylaws Committee members.

- 2. Eliminate from the Bylaws the 2- year limitation for Nominating Committee members.
- 3. Change the time frame for submitting Bylaws Amendments.

WEP/GPO Repeal: H.R. 82 Update – Congressman Ben Cline spoke at our Conference and announced that he is a cosponsor of H.R. 82. As of May 3, we have 319 cosponsors. LEGISLATION

Federal

The Social Security Fairness Act of 2023, The Social Security Fairness Act, <u>H.R.82/S.597</u> would fully repeal the WEP and GPO. H.R.82 has 319 co-sponsors. S.597 has 53 co-sponsors including Senator Tim Kaine.

The House Ways and Means Subcommittee on Social Security held a critical hearing on the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) and Government Pension Offset (GPO) on April 16, the second hearing this Congress focused on these issues. With 319 cosponsors for the bill to repeal WEP and GPO in the House, and continued committee attention, momentum is building to address these longstanding issues.

While the hearing featured think tank witnesses rather than representatives from those directly impacted, NARFE National President, William "Bill" Shackelford, and National Secretary/Treasurer, Kathryn Hensley, attended the hearing in person, demonstrating steadfast support for the repeal of WEP and GPO. Shackelford submitted testimony for the record on behalf of NARFE, and NARFE continues to work with the lead sponsors of the repeal bill and other allies to press for further action.

The hearing focused on the significant and longstanding effects WEP/GPO have on federal retirees citing many examples of disproportionately affected public servants who experience undue hardships from these provisions unfairly reducing their retirement benefits they, for years, have paid into.

The hearing included testimony from several witnesses who acknowledged how these provisions harm public servants, identifying how the outdated formulas used to calculate the WEP and GPO create unfair outcomes for beneficiaries affected by one or both policies. Witnesses and committee members also discussed solutions that advocated for more modest reforms rather than a full repeal. NARFE commends the many members who have also submitted written testimonies, helping to strengthen the call for change.

This hearing was a significant step in NARFE's ongoing advocacy efforts to correct the injustices of the WEP and GPO, ensuring that all public servants receive the full Social Security benefits they rightfully deserve.

MAY 2024 MEETING MINUTES

NARFE Roanoke Valley Chapter 111, Area VII, met on Friday, May 3, 2024 at Jersey Lily's restaurant. Frances Boatman, President, conducted the meeting. The meeting was called to order at 11:40 a.m. with 21 people in attendance including our guest speaker. A quorum was present to conduct chapter business.

May birthdays were recognized.

Wanda Ware discussed the journey of life. She then led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Secretary's minutes for the April 2024 meeting were approved as published, motion made by Gloria Clark, seconded by Wanda Ware.

Mark Fisher gave the April 2024 treasurer's report.

Carolyn Tucker, 1st VP, gave the membership report. Currently there are 155 chapter members.

Ellie Long, Secretary, reported one former and one current member deaths. LOA's Let's Give Lunch is Friday, June 21.

Bill Ketron gave the Legislation report.

Wanda Ware, Carolyn Tucker, and Elaine Drewry conducted our annual memorial service.

VFN Conference Reports were given by Carolyn Tucker, Bill Ketron, Phyllis Scruggs, and Anna Yu. All encouraged attendance next year. It's a good opportunity to meet members from other chapters across the state. All reported excellent learning experiences about, and beyond, NARFE. Noteworthy were the CIA, senior scams, and German POWs in Virginia presentations. Facilities and food were excellent.

Frances gave the President's report.

Dr. Diana Christopulos, from the Roanoke Appalachian Trail Club (RATC) was our guest speaker. The club maintains 120 miles of the AT in our region. Her talk, "Veterans, Federal Employees, and the Appalachian Trail" was about the history of the AT and federal involvement. 1921-1937 Dreaming and building the original AT (NGOs); Benton Mackaye and Myron Avery were leaders in creating and building the AT. In 1925, MacKaye organized the Appalachian Trail Conference (ATC), an all volunteer group. Avery, head of the ATC, moved along development efforts. The AT was finally connected as a continuous footpath stretching from Georgia to Maine in 1937, in some areas with CCC assistance. 1938-1968 Seeking better routes (NGOs and USFS/NPS); In 1938, the U.S. Forest Service and the National Park Service sign the "Appalachian Trailway Agreement," providing for a protected strip of land 100 yards on either side of the Trail where it passed through federal government lands, and assistance from the U.S Forest Service and the National Park Service in the construction of shelters along the Trail on their lands. RATC and ATC work with USFS to plan 170-mile relocation in Virginia to USFS land wherever possible. From about 1950 to

1980, the vast majority of male maintainers on the AT were veterans. 1968-1990 Acquiring and building a national trail (federal and state involvement with NGOs); In 1968 The National Trails System Act is signed into law making the AT a national scenic trail under federal protection. With the 1978 National Parks and Recreation Act, NPS land-acquisition project begins in earnest. 1990s-present Protecting the Trail and large landscapes around it. (ATC, NPS USFS) Congress appropriates \$15.1 million to carry combined A.T. land acquisition through 2000, with 15 years of tract-based appropriations to follow. The Appalachian Trail Conference becomes the Appalachian Trail Conservancy to reflect the top priority of preserving the Trail corridor and its natural and cultural resources. In 2014, a large landscape initiative was launched. In 2015, the McAfee Vista Preserve ~ 850 acres was created.

The 50/50 (Alzheimer's Fund) drawing was won by Reinhard O'Neill. There was no gift basket drawing.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:01 p.m.
